<sup>5.</sup> THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN never enter and have no lines in **Script**, but in the earliest programs the performers are listed as "Roger Matthews and the Board of Aldermen," a male quartet, who assist singing "Sing Me to Sleep, Dear Mammy"; see Critical Report.

<sup>6.</sup> STRUTT never enters and has no lines in **Script**, but nevertheless is credited in all extant programs.

<sup>7.</sup> **Script** lists "The Porter," who never enters but is credited in Chicago programs to Tom [Tommy] Woods, a dancer; this character is evidently identical to the OFFICE BOY, which is not in the **Script** cast of characters, but does enter and speak.

<sup>8.</sup> The earliest New York programs also list the Majestic Magnolias, consisting of five women.

<sup>9.</sup> Although several actual small towns in America are named Jimtown, none exist in "Dixieland," meaning the Southern United States, especially those states that composed the Confederate States of America. Jimtown was, however, a name frequently invoked in Miller & Lyles's comedy routines including their famous "Jimtown Fisticuffs." It is also attached to at least one song: "Charlie Davis's familiar 'Jimtown Blues.' " (Brooks, *Lost Sounds*, 350) Both usages reference Jimtown as not only Southern but also associated with African Americans: compare with "Jim Crow"—many usages—or "Jim Crack Corn," a minstrel song dating back to the 1840s. See *inter alia* Robert C. Toll, *Blacking Up: The Minstrel Show in Nineteenth-Century America* (New York: Oxford University Press, 1974), 49.
